The Wonderful Wizard of Oz

The Populist Movement was a push from farmers and laborers that grew from the grassroots farmers' fraternity known as The Grange. The Populist Party was formed in 1892 and ran James Weaver for President. The Populists pushed for a graduated income tax, free coinage of silver, the direct election of senators, government ownership of railroads and telegraphs, and establishment of sub-treasuries.

<u>Characteristics:</u> Kept the workers in bondage working long hours.
